
Kia ora koutou,

RTLB workforce demographics

The following RTLB workforce data has recently become available:

| Prioritised ethnic groups | Number of RTLB |
|--|----------------|
| Māori | 129 |
| Pacific | 30 |
| Asian | 24 |
| MELAA (Middle Eastern/ Latin American/African) | 6 |
| Other | 13 |
| European/Pākehā | 727 |
| Not stated | 41 |

Note:

1. The data relates to a snapshot of teacher information which was extracted from the first pay in April 2018.
2. Only main teacher roles (permanent and fixed term roles) are included in the table.
3. Teacher's ethnicity was collected as at April 2018, the information could change over time.
4. Prioritised ethnic groups involve each person being allocated to a single ethnic group, based on the ethnicities they have identified with, in the prioritised order of Māori, Pacific, Asian, MELAA (Middle Eastern/Latin American/African), Other and European. For example, if someone identifies as being Chinese and Māori, under the prioritised ethnic group method, they are classified as Māori in the table.

Claiming Additional Relief Teacher Funding (ARTF)

We have become aware a number of RTLB clusters are claiming Additional Relief Teacher Funding (ARTF) for teachers on paid sick leave.

Page 45 of *Governing and Managing RTLB Clusters* provides guidance on how this can be managed:

Sick leave reliever funding

Where an RTLB is absent, on paid sick leave, due to his or her own illness for at least one school week, and a suitably qualified (RTLB) reliever is employed to cover the absence, additional relief teacher funding (ARTF) reimbursement may be paid to the employing board. Reimbursement can be claimed from the first day of the RTLB's sick leave; the eight-day rule does not apply.

The ARTF policy applies in the case of RTLB absent for their own illness, not for leave granted to care for dependents or for board granted discretionary leave.

Relieving RTLB teachers must be coded as S23 against the school's bulk grant in order for the:

1. RTLB to receive the allowances associated with the RTLB position (APURT and SDA)
2. lead school to claim ARTF.

Coding can be done on a NOVO1t.

Ministry reimbursement for sick leave is not available for additional RTLB who are employed from cluster operational funding.
