**Te Toi Tupu - Leading learning Network** has been contracted by the Ministry to provide targeted gifted and talented education PLD support for schools in the North Island. The contract has a specific focus on gifted and talented students who are currently underachieving at school, particularly those learners in the target groups - gifted Māori and Pasifika students and gifted students who have special education needs.

One of the work strands in the contract involves the delivery of workshops for RTLB in each of the following regions: Whangarei, North Auckland, South Auckland, Hamilton, Rotorua, Napier, Whanganui and Wellington. Te Toi Tupu has funding for 20 participants to attend a one-day workshop in each of these centres (dates and venues TBC).

The workshops for RTLB will focus on the following topics:

• Identifying and providing for twice-exceptional students (gifted students who also have special education needs); and

• Understanding and catering for the social and emotional needs of gifted students (including issues such as perfectionism, underachievement, and disengagement from school).

## Commonwealth Education Good Practice Awards 2012
