RTLB Lead School Forum 2023

We look forward to meeting with Cluster leaders again at the RTLB Lead School Forum 2023, to be held in Wellington at Te Papa on 14 and 15 August. Trial and Refine of the Inclusive Design Modules - Lisa Thompson

In 2021 and 2022 the Ministry worked with CORE education and a kaitiaki rōpū to develop the inclusive design modules and videos. The modules are designed to be applied across the education system from early learning to secondary school to grow understanding of neurodiversity and the design of inclusive learning environments, in line with the principles of He Pikorua.

A 'trial and refine' approach is being used in Term 1 2023 to understand use of the modules in various contexts. Clusters 10, 14, 20, 30, 31, 32 and 33 are involved in the trials alongside Ministry teams, Regional Health Schools, a specialist school outreach service, and other schools. Special thanks to RTLB who are involved in the trials! Feedback from the trials will be used to prepare modules for wider use and release in June 2023 on TKI.

A communication plan will be developed to provide groups within the sector with information to champion the modules across their networks and schools. The modules will be part of a suite of resources that will support schools to strengthen their focus on inclusive practice that supports the delivery of the new bicultural and inclusive curriculum – Te Mātaiaho.

Getting school physical restraint policies in place – Anna Aitchison

In February we shared information about the new publication Aramai He Tētēkura – a guide to understanding distress and minimising the use of <u>physical restraint</u>. Registered teachers including RTLB are undertaking the training module.

The focus is now the requirement for all registered schools to have a policy on reducing student distress and the use of physical restraint by 7 May 2023. Schools can access support to develop their policy through New Zealand School Trustees Association NZSA who provides support directly to School Boards and SchoolDocs (where they are signed up to SchoolDocs).

- From 5 April NZSTA will provide School Boards with information (including a sample policy) and assistance to complete their school policies. Boards can also access NZSTA's <u>Resource Centre</u> and Support Centre on 0800 782 435.
- From 24 March, schools who are signed up to SchoolDocs will be able to access a draft policy (personalised to their school) via the SchoolDocs website.

Common Practice Model - Julie Hook

The Common Practice Model is now available on our website

Phase 1 describes evidence-informed pedagogical approaches that support teaching and learning in literacy, communication, and maths through *Te Whāriki: Early childhood curriculum* and *The New Zealand Curriculum*. Broadly speaking, while the New Zealand Curriculum focuses on 'what' is taught, the Common Practice Model focuses on 'how' it is taught. The Common Practice Model is in service to *The New Zealand Curriculum* and the progress steps in the NZC will be integral to the Common Practice Model as we develop the practices.

Phase 2 will outline practices to help kaiako teach literacy, communication, and maths, and this will be released later in 2023. There is a range of supporting materials on the Ministry's website to provide additional context for the Common Practice Model, including short videos, one-pagers, illustrations, and links to Education Gazette articles.
